Traffic Calming Proposals

SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL is holding a meeting on <u>Tuesday 8 July</u> to consider and approve proposals for traffic-calming in Compton. These proposals have been drawn up following the meetings with Compton residents earlier this year and having taken note of the many representations submitted. Once approved, there will be six to nine months of detailed design work with construction beginning in summer

2026. Compton Parish Council has established a working group to liaise with SCC during this design phase and to inform the village of progress. This group comprises **William Bagnall**, **Rev. Sally Buddle**, **David Hunt** and **Nick Wyschna**. Once detailed plans are known, these will be communicated via the *News* and other sources.

Phyllis Reeves - 1922-2025

Not many people around today will have known Phyllis (Phyl) Reeves, who recently died at the age of 103. She led a very full and interesting life, based in and around Compton, with connections to many people, places and organisations we still know today. It's worth remembering this special local woman whose death marks the passing of a bygone era that not many people will have experienced.

Phyllis was born at Berthorpe Lodge, Puttenham Heath Road, on 15 January 1922, her parents working for the Tuckwell family. Her claim to fame in later life — in all the Phyllis Tuckwell Shops where she volunteered — was that she had, as a little girl, attended Phyllis Tuckwell's wedding to Sir Edward Tuckwell, who founded the Phyllis Tuckwell Hospice in memory of his wife.

Before the by-pass was built, Compton and Puttenham were very much an entity.

Between the wars Phyl's mother, Alice Merrett, and Lady Boston of Monkshatch ran a Health & Welfare Clinic in the Village Hall. During the war, her family moved to the Greyfriars Estate on the Hog's Back and her working life started at the small wartime factories that had taken over part of Watts Gallery, so her life became more Compton-based. There were dances at the Village Hall, which was what is now Moors Cottage before the current Village Hall was built in 1934, with the doors wide open and dancing in the street!

In 1944 Phyl married her beloved Tom in St Nicholas Church, in Compton, on a special licence as he had returned from Gibraltar only three days before. Tom's family lived in Binscombe, where his father had settled, returning from WWI with General Longbourne of Loseley. The father and his three sons were all working on the Loseley Estate when war broke out. The boys went into the services and on return they were offered jobs and houses, both rare commodities in 1945.

So Phyl and Tom's life together began at Loseley, Phyl going from gardener's daughter to gardener's wife. Her heart and soul went into making a home and family for her two daughters, Rosemary and Heather. The home was a welcome place for their cousin Rodger who lived next door and a number of POWs who worked on the Estate, many of whom remained life-long friends, plus many others too, over the years. The family was also involved with all the new developments at Loseley Park, which came thick and fast and included opening the house to the public, setting up the garden and preparing some fields to create a Market Garden operation, which included Organic Vegetables and Pick Your Own soft fruit, years before these trends became mainstream.

Phyl's community spirit still found time for Compton; belonging to the Mothers Union, Young Wives and the Women's Institute. This led to many crafts and hobbies, flower shows at the British Legion, jumble sales, whist drives, plays and choirs. She would get around on her pushbike with Rosemary on pillion, before swapping it for a trusty moped and eventually a much loved Morris Minor, which enabled Phyl to take several older members of the WI to attend their social events. She enjoyed driving until she was 98!

On retiring in 1986, Tom and Phyl moved to Godalming, where she led a different but still very active life. She spent her days keeping in contact with friends on the phone and writing letters, knitting socks for her grandson, and in the last 18 months or so she enjoyed life on the internet with her iPad. Her mind was as active as it had ever been, recalling events throughout her life and in the world today. She did the crossword and the puzzles in the newspaper every day and could still pick a winner at the races on the TV.

Phyl died peacefully in her sleep at home, with Rosemary and Heather by her side. At her request, there will be no funeral but in line with the Guides' movement, a "Thinking Day" instead on <u>Tuesday 1 July</u> when you can spend a few moments thinking about Phyl, wherever you are. She was a Guide at heart throughout her life, from Brownie through to a Guide Ranger. If you wish to make a donation in her memory, please send it to any charity of your choice.

Talking of Centenarians, we also remember with sadness Mary Westmacott who has died in Littleton at the age of 101. Mary, the mother of Sarah More-Molyneux, was a much loved and respected member of the community, and a regular churchgoer at St Nicholas Compton. It is truly the end of an era with the death of these two remarkable women. We send our heartfelt love and sympathy to their children — Rosemary and Heather, and Sarah — and their families.
